An Interview with Colm Cooper

Here is a selection of the questions and answers from our interview with Colm 'The Gooch' Cooper when he visited our school on Wednesday 20th March 2013.

How did you feel when you won your first All Ireland?

"Delighted I suppose. You play football all your life to try to win an All Ireland. To play football for your county is the one thing you want to do. I was very lucky to be able to do it four times so if I could do it once more before I retire I'd be delighted."

What's it like being the best footballer of your generation?

"Who told you that! It's nice when people pay you compliments. Coming from Kerry, there's been lots of good footballers through the years. It's a compliment when people say that you're as good as them. The only way to stay there is by putting in the hard work. I've been lucky we've a great Kerry team since I've been playing."

If you had to transfer to another county, what would it be?

"Oh that's a very difficult question. I suppose I better be careful on this one now that I'm in Laois. We're very proud of Kerry so we don't like transferring too often. I don't know, I couldn't say another county, I'd say the people in Kerry would disown me so I'll stick with Kerry for the next couple of years."

How did you feel losing the final to Dublin in 2009?

"Well it's obviously very disappointing when you lose any match. To lose the final, well there was personal disappointment for me because I was the captain that day. With four or five minutes to go everything was going to plan and we were up four or five points but Dublin got a goal. Well I suppose that's sport. We have some great days and some bad ones, if you can get 50% strike rate that's not too bad. I wasn't very happy when Cluxton came up field to kick that point. It's disappointing but that's sport, it has its ups and downs."

Why are you known as "The Gooch"?

"There's no big story behind it. I play with my club Doctor Crokes in Kilarney and we had a goalkeeper who was a bit of a funny guy. When playing at 7 or 8 years old one day he came out with "The


